### **ALL IN FOR HEALTH**



# Advocacy Through **ElevateDD**

For 40 years, the Down Syndrome Association of Central Ohio (DSACO) has advocated for families, which has inspired programs like Learning Aid Ohio and Adult Literacy Ohio. And over the years, DSACO has become the parent organization over these two programs, which benefit both the Down syndrome community and the developmental disability community throughout Ohio.

And while we wanted to elevate the voices and needs of families and people with developmental disabilities, we also wanted DSACO to remain focused on the Down syndrome community. That is why, in 2023, we began to develop ElevateDD as the advocacy, education, and innovation platform that supports all three communities-DSACO, Learning Aid Ohio, and Adult Literacy Ohioas well as the entire developmental disability community in Ohio.

The ElevateDD name represents what drives our advocacy, education, and innovation: elevating the voices of people with developmental disabilities, elevating the needs of families, and elevating advocacy issues to leaders and decision makers.





# **ALL Together**

What makes the Down Syndrome Association of Central Ohio (DSACO) both powerful and personal is our amazing community of people with Down syndrome and their families. They drive the important work and the deep connections made throughout Central Ohio.

For 40 years, the voices and involvement of our community have directly guided our advocacy and programming.

We are committed to our mission:

To support families, promote community involvement, and encourage a lifetime of opportunities for people with Down syndrome.



### IN 2023:

- We promoted community involvement by expanding our support groups for Somali, Latino, Black & African American, and rural families.
- We supported the physical and mental health of adults with Down syndrome by launching a health and wellness program.
- We encouraged inclusion through our new Community Access Funds program, which reimburses families for funds spent on inclusive activities in the community.

**92 families** were supported by the Adopt-A-Family Program

**50 Hospital Care Packages** were sent to families experiencing an extended hospital stay

10 families were supported through our Gifts of Kindness partnership with the Columbus Foundation, providing \$21,000 in support to families at risk of being evicted or becoming unhoused

**107 families** utilized Community Access funds for inclusive activities

## **ALL Access**

While Learning Aid Ohio began as a response to the learning challenges of distance learning in 2020, the immense growth and positive response from families have proven its ongoing, critical role for students with developmental disabilities.

Learning Aid Ohio provides students (learning on IEPs and 504 Plans) grants for in-person, supplemental learning support. We connect families with Learning Providers to help students stay on track toward their academic goals, specific to their individual needs, and based on the curriculum their traditional teachers set. This resource gives learners and families individual time with a tutor or therapists for their specialized needs.

And while this space was found during the pandemic, it became a vital program in the state of Ohio. In 2023, we secured state funding, grants, and donors to continue the program (which had been federally funded for Covid relief) to meet more learners' needs.



2,314 school-age children in79 Ohio counties received39,900 hours of individualized tutoring in 2023

## **ALL Invested**

Whatever the reason, adults with developmental disabilities are expressing the desire to do more in life that requires the ability to read. Adult Literacy Ohio empowers adults with developmental disabilities through literacy. This program exists because there is urgency and a right for them to know how to develop in their literacy.

Our goal is to provide funding and one-on one-tutoring so that adults with developmental disabilities are pursuing more of what they want in life. Adult Literacy Ohio is driven by its learners and what they want to achieve. This program is centered on the person with a developmental disability and supporting their learning goals.

To continue our understanding of how we best serve our community, we recently partnered with OCALI to conduct a reading general interest survey—beyond high school for adults with developmental disabilities. Its results have already provided more than 600 responses, which is used as both quantifiable data and input to best to serve them in this space.




**44 adults** received **1,004 hours** of literacy-based tutoring in 2023
